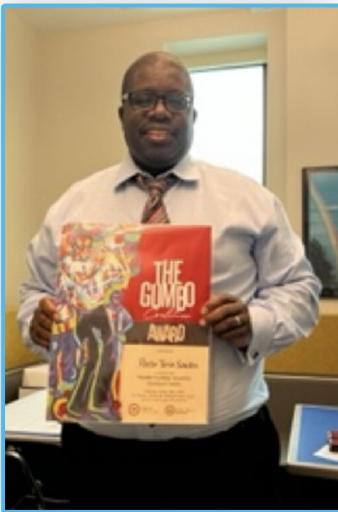


SCHOOL OF SOCIAL WORK

Increase in Grant Awarded by the National Institutes of Health (NIH) All of Us Research Program (2022 – 2023 Academic Year) Dr. Derrick Freeman (Associate Professor of Social Work, Grant - PI), Dr. Rebecca Chaisson (Dean of the Millie M. Charles School of Social Work, Grant - CoPI), Ms. Camille Alexander (MSW Admissions Coordinator, Grant - Program Assistant), and six graduate assistants will continue to work throughout the Greater New Orleans Metropolitan area to promote the participation of Black, Indigenous, and People of Color (BIPOC) communities (the most underrepresented research communities/populations) in the All of Us Research Program.

The All of Us Research program is centered on health disparities research and ways to engage the named underrepresented populations in health research. It is inviting one million people across the U.S. to help build one of the most diverse health databases in history. As a result of the good work by Dr. Freeman, the students, and the staff at SUNO, the program received a 15% increase in funding for the 2022-2023 year.

The All of Us Research Program welcomes participants from all backgrounds. Through clinical research, investigators will use the data gleaned from this program to learn how biology, lifestyle, and the environment affect health. The program makes the national data bank accessible to SUNO by providing data that can be used by faculty, staff, and students conducting research.

Chair of Ethics Review Board, Gumbo Coalition, and Grief and Trauma Expert

Dr. Torin Sanders has been involved in a number of activities this month. On June 13, he was elected as Chair of the City of New Orleans Ethics Review Board. The Ethics Review Board is authorized by the Code of Ordinances for the City of New Orleans to administer and enforce the provisions of the Code. The Code applies to all city government officials, whether elected or appointed; all employees, whether classified or unclassified; and all members and employees of all boards, agencies, commissions, advisory committees, public trusts, and public benefit corporations of the City. Dr. Sanders has served on the Ethics Review Board, which meets monthly, since 2020. It is an honor for SUNO to provide leadership for the City of New Orleans in this area of governmental function.

On the national scene, as part of the Essence Festival Celebration, On July 1, 2022, Dr. Torin Sanders was among the community and civic leaders to receive the 1st annual Gumbo Coalition award presented by Marc Morial, former Mayor of New Orleans and current President/CEO of The National Urban League. The luncheon was held at Messina's at the New Orleans Lakefront Airport. The awards presented at this luncheon were to recognize select contributions.

Dr. Sanders is also a co-host with Oliver Thomas on WBOK's "Good Morning" show features an interview with local newsmakers, elected officials, and cultural ambassadors. He has interviewed Mayor Cantrell, Chief Shaun Ferguson (a SUNO graduate), and our own Chancellor James Ammons. WBOK is the only Black-owned station in the region, and it serves to feature news unique and valuable to the regional Black community.

DR. PATRICE SENTINO
WGNO'S REMARKABLE WOMAN, ECHOING GREEN ACCELERATOR AND SCHOOL BOARD CANDIDATE DISTRICT ONE

Dr. Patrice Sentino was named a Remarkable Women for her work in the Community through the Center for Hope and the local community. After a decade of experience with the juvenile justice and mental health systems, Dr. Sentino opened the Center for Hope Children and Family Services to prevent the hospitalization of individuals with mental health needs while promoting productive management of the emotional well-being of youth and their families. She wanted families with challenging issues to feel hopeful and youth struggling with emotional problems to feel bright and realize their dreams. She has been successful in that effort. Dr. Sentino embodies that belief in her work with students in the School of Social Work, where she serves as an Assistant Professor. She also serves SUNO as the Title IX Director.

Dr. Sentino is also leading the Echoing Green events on the SUNO campus this fall. Echoing Green identifies transformative leaders that will help solve issues in environmental justice, policing reform, culturally responsive education, and more. In addition to Echoing Green, Dr. Sentino facilitates scholarships for SUNO students through the National Coalition of 100 Black Women, Greater New Orleans Chapter, Inc. The announcement for this HBCU scholarship has been disseminated to faculty, staff, and students at SUNO. The application is due on August 31, 2022.

More recently, Dr. Sentino has represented the League of Women Voters on the Louisiana Department of Insurance, Louisiana Healthcare Commission. This is a vital role as it relates to Health Care equity in Louisiana, especially the health care of marginalized residents of the state.

Dr. Sentino is running for the Orleans Parish School Board District One seat. We wish her well in this campaign that will contribute to the dialogue about one of the most pressing issues in K-12 education; mental health services that focus on trauma-informed educational systems.

Dr. Clyde C. Robertson-Center for African and African American Studies

During the summer of 2022, the Director of the Center for African and African American Studies (CAAAS), Clyde C. Robertson, Ph.D., secured the Louisiana Board of Regents Grant (ATLAS). This prestigious grant will allow Dr. Robertson to convert the Pontchartrain Park Pioneers Oral History Project into a documentary titled, Trailblazers and History Makers: A Documentary about the Pontchartrain Park Pioneers.

The Louisiana Lieutenant Governor's Office (LLGO) designated Dr. Robertson's Pontchartrain Park Pioneers Oral History Project as a Success Story. The office above will house the collected oral histories on its website. Moreover, the LLGO will share copies of this important initiative with the National Park Service.

In addition, On June 30, 2022, Dr. Clyde C. Robertson was a scheduled speaker at the unveiling of the historical marker recognizing Pontchartrain Park as a National Historic Neighborhood. "Pontchartrain Park was a 'Can Do' neighborhood. A place where parents and other adults modeled success and excellence for children like me," said Robertson.

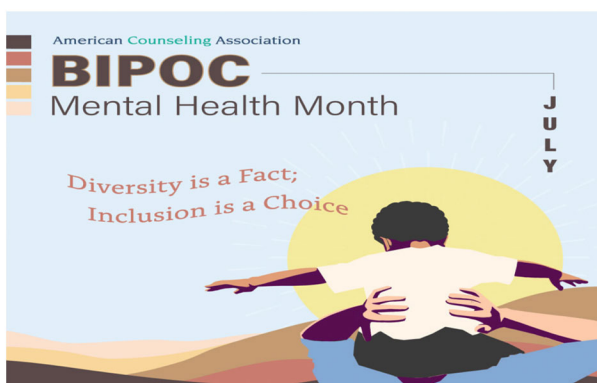
STUDENT DEVELOPMENT CENTER COMMUNITY SERVICE-LEARNING

CAMPUS POLICE

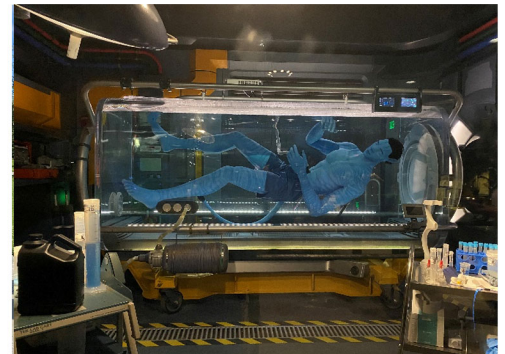

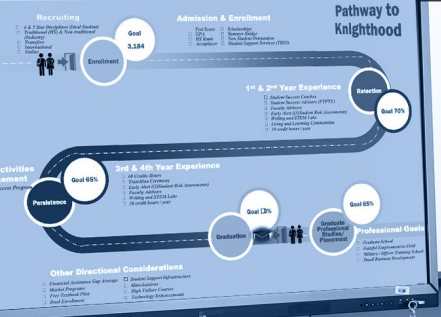
